

2007-08 FACULTY MEMBER OF THE YEAR

BOB BURGIN

Burgin has been named the recipient of the 2007-08 Faculty Member of the Year Award. Burgin has taught in the DBU Dorothy M. Bush College of Education since 1999, serving as associate dean of the College, as well as assistant professor of education and director of the secondary education department.

Burgin and his wife, Tillie, are former missionaries, serving in Korea from 1966-1978. Upon their return to the United States, the couple began to work in the Arlington Independent School District, Tillie in administration as director of personnel and Bob in the schools as assistant principal and principal for Nichols Junior High School and principal of Arlington High School. In 1993, Burgin retired from Arlington ISD, but he returned in 1999 to help DBU train the next generation of teachers.

The Burgins have been married for over 50 years, and they have two children, Jim and Rick. They are active members of First Baptist Church of Arlington, where Tillie founded a local outreach ministry in 1986. Over the years, this ministry has grown to become Mission Arlington, a model for other community outreach efforts throughout the nation.
