
SCRIPTURE REFERENCES





ne of the clearest ways in which the commands of the Shema are seen on the DBU campus is through the display of the Word of God throughout campus. Taking the command very literally, Biblical passages are on display on door frames, walls, gates, and cornerstones inside and outside of every building on campus.

DBU holds firm to the truths of God's revealed Word, and we want to remind our students daily of the hope and direction that can be found in the Bible. Among the many verses on display, a few are special in the life of the University.

In particular, the promise of God found in Jeremiah 29:11-13 serves as the theme verse for DBU and is seen in various places throughout campus, in publications that go out to the DBU family, and in promotional materials sent to potential students. Through these words, we try to encourage others to seek the Lord first with all decisions in their lives, especially for those making the decision on which college to choose and what career to pursue. Only through prayer and supplication will the Lord reveal His plans for our lives, plans to give us hope and a future, plans to allow us to share His glory to the nations.

Another main verse for the campus comes from Proverbs 3:5-6, as we are told, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths." This verse is especially dear to the heart of Dr. Gary Cook, DBU president, and it is seen throughout the campus in order to remind students to trust in the will and wisdom of God rather than our own plans.

These are only two examples of the multitude of verses that are seen throughout the campus. Outside of music rooms, students are charged to "Sing for joy in the Lord." Inside classrooms, the words are displayed that those who wait on the Lord will "renew their strength." As athletes enter their locker rooms, they are met with the challenging words from Paul in Acts 20:24, reminding them that the ultimate goal in life is to finish the race Christ has set before them.

OUR MISSION Statement

In 1993, the DBU faculty and Board of Trustees adopted a new mission statement for the school, one which emphasized the University's commitment to its Christian heritage as well as articulated the desired outcome of its students. Since that time, DBU classrooms have been infused with concepts of the integration of faith and learning and servant leadership, regardless of the subject matter. Business, chemistry, philosophy, music, and education courses, just to name a few, each stress the ways in which Christian conviction shapes an understanding of the subject and how this newfound understanding should in turn be used to serve others.

DALLAS BAPTIST UNIVERSITY MISSION STATEMENT


